WINTER FIELD TRIP IDEAS

Crow Hassan Prairie Management Area

This area provides a unique opportunity to compare a remnant prairie, a prairie restoration and a prairie grassland all within 10 acres. The restoration unit is unusual for our area because it is a natural 5 acre stand of little bluestem within which District personnel have planted numerous prairie forbs. Blazing star, stiff goldenrod, thimbleweed, whorled milkweed, and giant hyssop can be seen sticking up through the snow. Finally, these two areas are surrounded by over 500 acres of prairie grasses, which create the impression of a sea of grass stretching to the horizon.

Crow-Hassan Park Reserve is in the northwest corner of Hennepin County between the towns of Hanover, Rogers, and St. Michael. An old farm road provides access to the prairie from the central parking lot for those willing to walk a few miles.
